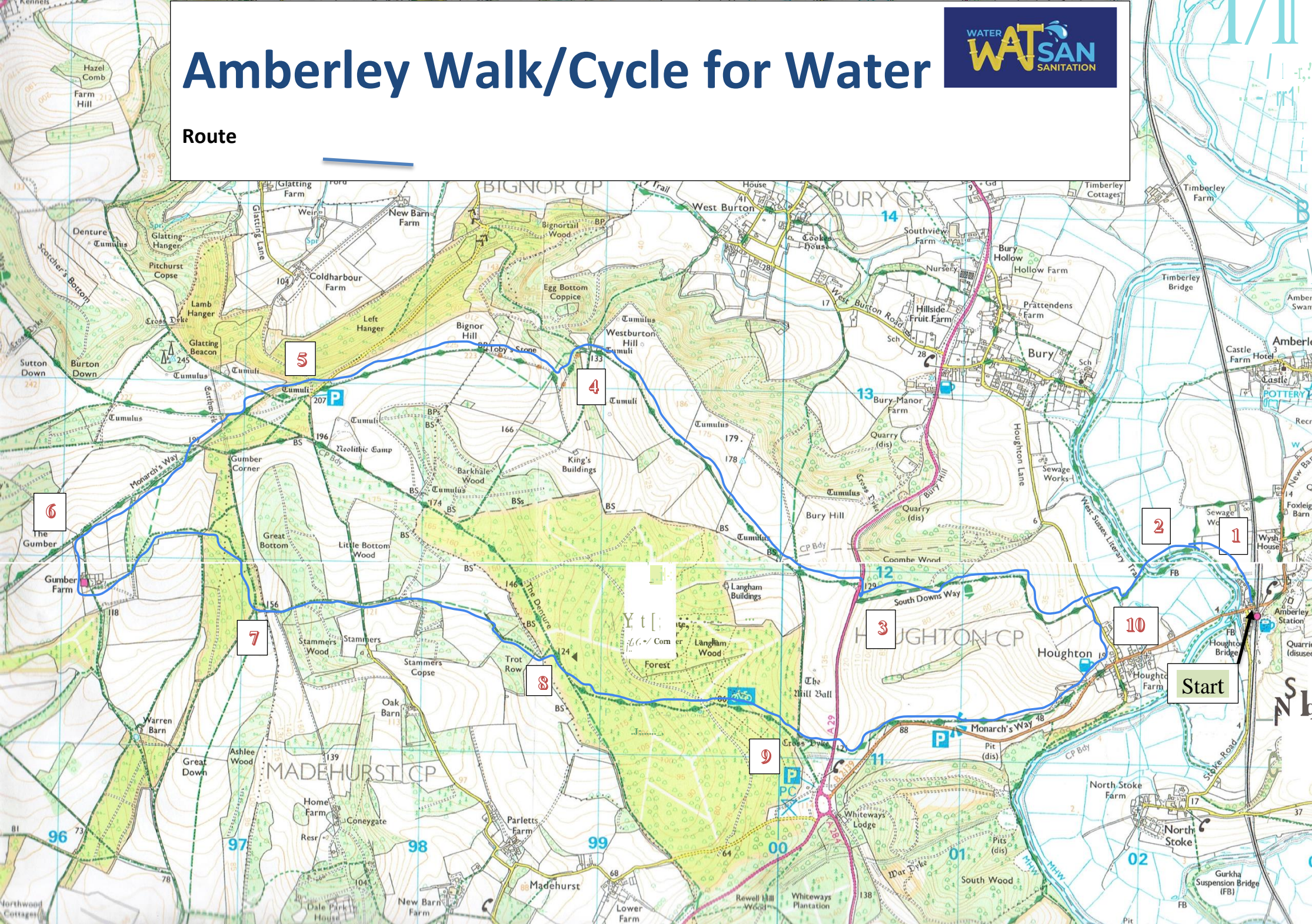


Amberley Walk/Cycle for Water

Amberley Walk/Cycle for Water



THE ROUTE starts from the Riverside Café in Amberley, where we will meet at 9.30am on Saturday 18th June and is about 12 miles in length. Car parking is available adjacent to Amberley railway station. Turn left out of the Riverside Café towards Amberley station then take the FP on the left before the railway bridge and follow this along the river (1) to meet the South Downs Way (SDW). Cross over the river (2) and continue along the SDW. WFW marshalls will meet you at 3 to assist in crossing over the A29. Carry on along the SDW to the junction (4) and take the second left continuing along the SDW (*To take the shorter route of 8 miles approx. take the first track on the left to join the Monarch's Way bridlepath and the route at 3*). At a junction with a barn on your right, carry on up the hill, keeping on the SDW. From the brow of the rise you will see two radio masts and then the car park at Bignor Top (5) where WFW marshalls will meet you. From the car park continue along the SDW to the junction with the Monarch's Way (Stane Street) where you turn off the SDW via a pedestrian gate. Continue south west along the Monarch's Way (Stane Street). At 6 take the foot path on the left towards Gumber Farm. Turn left immediately after Gumber Farmhouse across the field. Access the path at the top lefthand corner of the field, through the gate. Continue into the dip and up, through the wood, eventually turning right at the T junction with another bridleway running north-south. At 7 turn left onto the path through Stanmers Wood and continue to the junction with the Monarch's Way (8). Continue along the Monarch's Way bridlepath towards Whiteways Lodge (9). (*At the roundabout, adjacent to Whiteways car park, there is a café with toilets*). Just north of the roundabout, cross the A29 and continue along the Monarch's Way, parallel to the B2139. At Houghton carry onto the road, with care(!) and turn left onto Houghton Road (10). After 1/3 of a mile turn left onto the SDW and retrace your route over the river and back to the Riverside Café at Amberley, where the walk/cycle ride ends!

Kazuru consists of a community of about 1400 people from 4 villages, which include 2 schools, 2 churches and a health centre. In common with many communities in Uganda the present water supply is inadequate and inaccessible, and sanitation facilities are likewise poorly constructed and overloaded.

Currently water is collected from a distant dilapidated spring, or even a polluted stream.

Kazuru is located in remote part of Kanungu District, which coincides with the Diocese of Kinkiizi, in the SW of Uganda, close to the border with the Democratic Republic of the Congo. The community live very close to the Impenetrable Forest, known locally as Bwindi. A number of the beneficiaries to the project are those from the Batwa tribe, previously known as Pygmies, who traditionally lived as hunter gatherers within the Impenetrable Forest, but now are being assisted to farm the land.

WATSAN stands for water, sanitation and health education in an area of rural S.W. Uganda the size of Oxfordshire with a population of half a million people.

Women and children in rural Uganda often walk as much as 6 miles, sometimes several times a day, to collect water, which even then is usually dirty and polluted. This represents a heavy toll on health, education and economic development

As part of their mission to share God's love in practical ways, the Church of Uganda Dioceses of North Kigezi and Kinkiizi manage an integrated project for drinking water supply, hygiene education and sanitation.

WATSAN UK supports this project as partners with our Ugandan friends and colleagues. These walks are part of our current fundraising efforts in support of the KAZURU scheme described opposite.
